

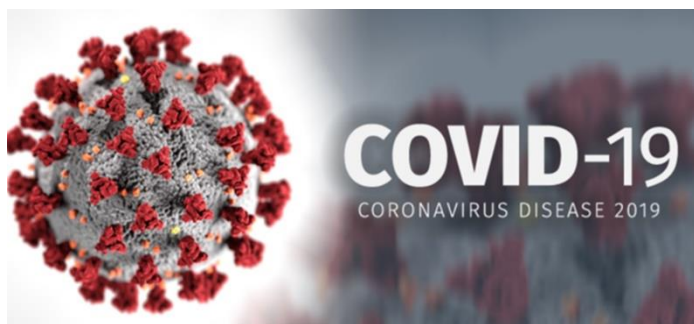

Detroit Refinery Response to COVID-19

At Marathon Petroleum, our priority is to protect our employees, contractors and the communities we serve as we continue providing the fuels and other products that are essential to keeping us all safe.



Marathon Petroleum has had a pandemic response plan in place for many years. Since January, as the COVID-19 outbreak has spread, we have reviewed and updated our plan, guided by global health experts including the Centers for Disease Control, the World Health Organization, local health authorities, and state and federal governments.

Additionally, Marathon Petroleum is promoting proven personal hygiene practices to employees, including frequent handwashing, covering coughs and sneezes and minimizing physical contact where possible. As many U.S. states have implemented "social distancing" measures to reduce the probability of spreading the virus from otherwise healthy people to those most at risk, Marathon Petroleum has introduced remote working programs; limited attendance and duration of meetings; restricted visitors at our facilities; and have actively encouraged employees to avoid large crowds and unnecessary physical contact. Other company policies have been updated to reflect the changing work environment and to accommodate the needs of our employees.

Other measures in place have included targeted travel restrictions; self-quarantine guidelines; additional cleaning protocols; business-continuity plans to accommodate staffing needs in the event of illness-related absenteeism; working with critical suppliers to ensure ongoing support in the event of illness-related disruptions; providing additional hand-sanitizers at owned-and-operated retail stores; and communicating frequently to all employees regarding the risks of COVID-19, and mitigation steps they should take to protect themselves and others.

The energy industry is critical to the nation's infrastructure and the Detroit refinery is maintaining production capabilities. We are necessarily exempt from some state and local restrictions in order to ensure this service and have implemented other measures at our facilities to protect our employees, contractors and the communities we serve. We continue to monitor the latest local and national developments regarding COVID-19 and adjust our response to the situation daily, as events warrant.

Marathon Petroleum Supports COVID-19 Efforts

At the Local Level

MPC donated nearly 40,000 masks to local and regional Michigan hospitals, including **Beaumont Health System, Wayne Campus, Henry Ford Hospital, Beaumont Children's Hospital and the Helen DeVoss Children's Hospital.**

Additionally, the Detroit refinery made a \$5,000 donation to the Detroit Public Safety Foundation to assist the needs of DPD and DFD during this unprecedented time. And another \$5,000 donation to the local Salvation Army for PPE for workers and food for those being affected by COVID-19.

"These donations are our humble contribution to help make their jobs safer and support their brave efforts.

We probably never think of these folks on the front line of this pandemic, like we do nurses and doctors, but they are right there feeding the people in our community," added Leaver.

For those in the 48217-zip code, the refinery teamed up with the Kemeny Center to provide cleaning and personal hygiene items that the City of Detroit Parks & Recreation Division distributed to those in need. Items that were provided include disinfectant spray, hand sanitizer, laundry detergent, toothpaste, toothbrushes, razors and deodorant among other items. Residents are asked to inquire at the Kemeny Center as to the current availability of these items.



At the National Level

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, Marathon Petroleum donated more than 575,000 N95 respirator masks to 45 hospitals and other healthcare organizations in 20 states to help protect healthcare providers as they treat patients infected with COVID-19. The masks were from a supply MPC prepared years ago as part of its pandemic response plan.



In addition, the Marathon Petroleum Foundation donated \$1 million to the American Red Cross which will help supply critical resources necessary to safely provide disaster relief and support to those in crisis during the COVID-19 pandemic and beyond.

MPC also announced to its employees that the company will match 100% of employee donations to a qualifying charity that the employee chooses, up to \$10,000 per employee. The charity will get the employee contribution immediately and the matching contribution from MPC roughly 30 days later. This is effective for the entire year!

Michael J. Hennigan Named President and Chief Executive Officer



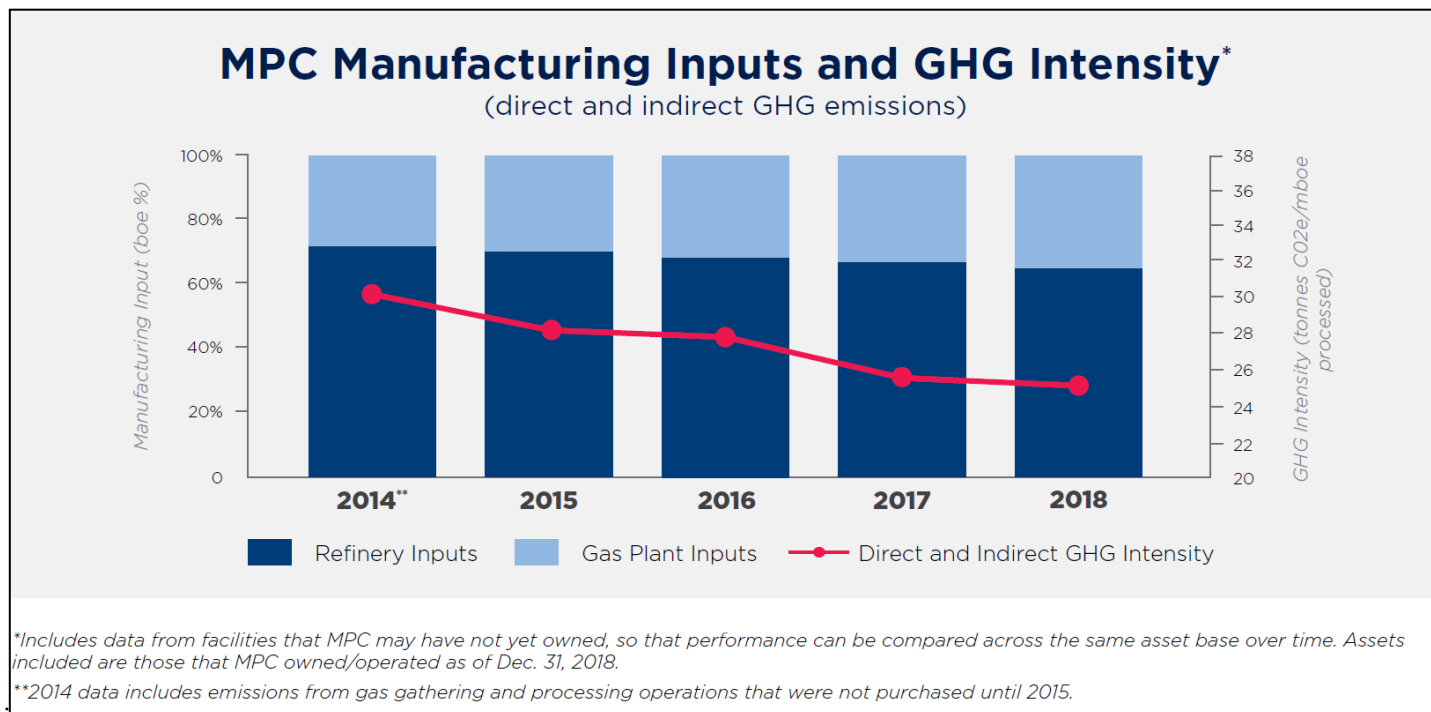
Marathon Petroleum Corporation recently announced that Michael J. Hennigan has been appointed president and chief executive officer and will join the company's Board of Directors following the company's 2020 annual meeting of shareholders on April 29, 2020.

As announced last October, current Chairman and Chief Executive Officer Gary R. Heminger retired in April after 45 years of service to the company.

As MPC's new president and CEO, Hennigan brings 38 years of energy industry experience in the refining and midstream space, including nearly three years with MPLX LP. Hennigan will continue to serve as president and chief executive officer of MPLX GP LLC, the general partner of MPLX.

Marathon Petroleum Establishes Greenhouse Gas Emissions Goal

Marathon Petroleum Corp. (MPC) has established a companywide goal to reduce its greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions per barrel of oil equivalent (BOE) processed to 30% below 2014 levels by 2030. The company has linked achievement of the goal to its executive compensation program and certain employee programs.



The 2030 goal builds upon the business strategy MPC highlighted in its Perspectives on Climate-Related Scenarios report, which has lowered MPC's GHG emissions intensity by approximately 20% over the past five years. Additional focus areas to achieve the 2030 goal include expanding its energy efficiency program, reducing methane emissions and increasing use of renewable energy. MPC is committed to reassessing this goal as achievements toward GHG emissions intensity reductions are realized.

Rep. Tyrone Carter Shares His COVID-19 Experience and Offers Advice to Keep You Safe



Tyrone Carter (D) is a member of Michigan House of Representatives for District 6, which covers a portion of the city of Detroit, Ecorse and River Rouge. In April, Rep. Carter tested positive for COVID-19. The Detroit refinery asked him to share his experience and advice for his *constituents* in Southwest Detroit.

First and foremost: How are you feeling?

I am fully recovered! As you know, I tested positive on March 26th, and on Tuesday, April 14th, I re-tested and the results were negative for the virus.

Given your first-hand experience, what kind of advice do you have for those looking to avoid contracting the COVID-19 virus?

Follow the CDC guidelines, wash your hands, avoid touching your face, stay home and stay safe.

And for those who may have contracted COVID: What's the best advice for a safe recovery?

Follow the doctor's orders. Like any virus, it has to run its course. Stay hydrated with plenty of water and warm beverages. Take Tylenol for the fever if you haven't been prescribed anything and stay away from people. My symptoms were the worst for about four days (high fever, chills, body aches, no taste or appetite, and a dry cough).

- Take this time to slow down and spend time with your kids or family because this has been a reminder of what is truly important in life.

Southwest Detroit as we know - is and will continue to suffer long after this health crisis is over and there are a lot of people in need. Use your skill set and pitch in. I think with the economic impact, trade for services could be beneficial for some of our community members who have lost their source of income.

What can residents be doing while they are at home during the Stay-at-Home order?

Spend some time and do the following:

- Census: Residents can complete the 2020 Census Questionnaire at www.my2020census.gov
- Volunteer if you are able, make phone calls, send emails, etc.
- Donate Blood and Plasma: Red Cross is seeking fully recovered COVID-19 patients to donate plasma. Other residents can donate blood at www.redcrossblood.org.
